Rick Butler is a professional Intelligence Officer that has served in a variety of military intelligence and civilian law enforcement intelligence positions over the past 26 years. He has provided traditional military intelligence in support of tactical and operational level U.S. Military commanders and combined military and criminal analytical support for international prosecutors and related law enforcement professionals conducting investigations into violations of International Humanitarian Law (to include the Law of Armed Conflict) during the conflict in the former Yugoslavia. In his current position he is responsible for intelligence and criminal research support for U.S. domestic law enforcement activities focusing on the identification, prosecution, and removal of foreign war crimes suspects and human rights violators residing in the United States.

He has authored several articles about the military aspect of international war crimes and the law of war, has provided expert testimony on war crimes related to issues pertinent to the Balkans conflict at the International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia, and has served as an expert on the field of war crimes related issues in the U.S. Federal District Court and in U.S. Immigration Court.
